SULTAN BASIN ROAD/US 2 PHASE III
339TH AVENUE (Rice Road) INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENTS

We are in the process of re-applying to the United States House and Senate for Federal Allocated Funds for these two projects.

CDBG

I spent two days on the Snohomish County Technical Advisory Committee reviewing Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) applications, of which, Sultan submitted two grant proposals:

- Phase II of 2nd Street Reconstruction
- 6th Street Construction

Unfortunately, because Sultan has four outstanding grant funded projects from previous years, the recommended funding was -0-. Their recommendation was to complete and close out the existing projects this year and come back to them next year.

SPORTSMEN & REESE PARK GRANT(S)

Bid were opened and are in review at CDBG Administration

RECORDS MANAGEMENT GRANT

The imaging company missed imaging the minutes from 1905 – 1945, thus delaying distribution of the CD ROM. Project should be complete by May 2007.

VETERAN'S REMEMBRANCE EMBLUM GRANT

Sultan partnered with the Sportsmen Club with this application, and was awarded \$4,000 to purchase one granite wall. Project must be complete by June 2007.

DEDICATION & RIBBON CUTTING

The Dedication and Ribbon Cutting for the Sultan Basin Road/US 2 Realignment will be Friday February 23, 2007 at 11:00 AM.

- Presentation of a ceremonial check (\$1,009,064) for Phase III of the project to Mayor Tolson from Bob Drewell, Executive Director of Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC)
- Reception at Community Center with hospitality provided by W&H Pacific and the City of Sultan, including additional speeches

CITY/SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT

There has been a problem with vehicles on the Emergency Evacuation Trail. The committee is checking with counsel to determine what is needed to cite the persons operating the vehicles.

I'm pleased to congratulate your community on receiving \$1,009,164 in PSRC funding for the project 'Sultan Basin Road & US 2 Realignment Phase III'.

The PSRC Executive Board voted in October to approve a total of \$502.4 million for 122 priority projects that will improve local and regional mobility. The projects represent an important step forward in accomplishing our long-range regional transportation plan, Destination 2030. The Governor and the federal funding agencies gave their final approval to the projects on February 6th, 2007, so your funds are now ready to go.

The project selection process is always highly competitive, with so many important projects but limited funding to go around. Thanks to your leadership and excellent work by your staff, we're making progress on creating the safe and efficient transportation system needed to assure continued economic prosperity and high quality of life in the region.
